For Step 3; MD or DO degree holders from AOA- or LCME accredited medical school, as well as medical school graduates outside the United States and Canada should send in their applications by rigorously following the instructions stipulated on FSMB website. However, condition applies; the medical schools in question must be listed in the World Directory of Medical Schools.
